	All applicants must evidence as part of their application: • that they hold a BSc Hons/ BSc Degree or provide evidence of successful
	that they hold a BSc Hons/ BSc Degree or provide evidence of successful completion of academic study at level 6
	confirm they are of Good Health and Character and are not undergoing any
	live formal professional, criminal or internal investigation, disciplinary hearings
	or serving a live disciplinary warning or formal underperformance procedure (as at date of application).
Integrated Independent/ Supplementary prescribing (V300) component of SPQ	V300 has been seamlessly integrated into all SPQ programmes with the proficiencies set out in the NMC standards for post-registration programmes (2023) and the Royal Pharmaceutical Society's (RPS) Competency From every formal Propositions (2024).
programmes	Framework for all Prescribers (2021).
programmes	 Applicants must be registered with the NMC for a minimum of one year prior to applying for entry onto a SPQ/integrated prescribing programme.
	The Practice Assessor must be a registered healthcare professional and an
	experienced prescriber with suitable equivalent qualifications for the programme the student is undertaking (NMC, 2023). (Experienced prescriber is defined as an active prescriber who would normally have at least 3 years'
	recent prescribing experience, (RPS, 2021)
	Students undertaking a SPQ/integrated prescribing programme may require two nominated Practice Assessors during their practice placement. One Practice Assessor to assess the NMC SPQ proficiencies and one Practice Assessor to assess the RPS prescribing competencies.
Programme Structure	SPQ with integrated prescribing programme: Part-time and full-time options available. Includes 90 practice learning days (an increase of 15 days) delivered in blocks of various lengths
	SCPHN: Part-time and full-time options available. Includes 130 practice learning days (an increase from 128 days) delivered in blocks of various lengths.
